THE T-CLOCK INSPECTION

The Motorcycle Safety Foundation created the T-CLOCK mnemonic as a memory and organization ad for a pre-ride safety check of a typical motorcycle. Each letter represents a particular inspection category, as follows:

- T Tires & Wheels
- C Controls
- L Lights & Electrics
- **O** Oil
- C Chassis
- K Kickstand

TIRES AND WHEELS

Tires: Pressure correct (cold), tread condition. No cut, bulges, punctures of foreign objects.

Wheels: Spokes tight and intact; rims true; no free play when flexed; bearing seals intact; spin freely.

Brakes: Firm feel; sufficient pad depth, no leaks or links in hoses or cables.

CONTROLS

Levers: Pivot bolt and nut; action and position correct; pivots lubed.

Cables: Ends and shafts lubed; no fraying or kinks; no binding when handlebar turned; proper adjustment.

Hoses: Check for damage or leaks, proper routing.

Throttle: Snaps closed freely when released; no excess play.

LIGHTS

Brake and Taillight(s): All filaments work; both levers actuate brake light.

Headlight: All filaments work; properly aimed; no damage.

Lenses: Clean; no condensation; tight.

Reflectors: Clean; intact.

Battery: Fluid level; terminals clean and tight; held down securely; vent tube not kinked or miss-routed.

Wiring: Check for pinching or fraying; properly routed; no corrosion.

OIL AND FLUIDS

Levels: Brake fluid, oil, final drive, transmission, coolant, fuel.

Leaks: Check all systems for leaks.

Condition: Check color of brake fluid & coolant.

CHASSIS

Frame: Paint lifting or peeling may indicate cracking.

Steering head & swingarm bearings: Lift wheels off floor, grab lower fork legs and pull and push to feel for play; repeat at rear. Turn fork to feel for detents in bearings.

Suspension: Smooth movement; proper adjustment; no leaks.

Chain or belt: Tension; lube, look for wear.

Fasteners: Look for missing or loose threaded fasteners, clips, pins.

KICKSTAND

Sidestand: Retracts firmly; no bending or damage; cutout switch operates; spring intact. Centerstand: Retracts firmly, no damage.

Road Captains

Some bikers put their motorcycles away after Labor Day weekend, but many look forward to what can be some of the best riding weather. If you're planning on riding during autumn, make sure your bike is safe and ready to handle the change of the season.

Here are a few safety reminders to help you stay safe and avoid a <u>motorcycle accident</u>, even as the leaves begin to change:

Check the Mechanics

After the summer riding season, your bike may need a tune-up. Check that all parts are functioning correctly and that you have good tread and air pressure in your tires. Make sure your fluid levels are good and that all controls are working properly.

Wear Proper Clothing

Autumn has many temperature changes. It can be quite chilly in the morning and still reach the mid-70s or 80s in the afternoon, depending on where you are. The best thing you can do to adjust to the changes is to dress in layers. You should never wear cotton as a base layer. Use thermal underwear or something with a synthetic blend as your base layer. On top of the base layer, wear comfortable riding attire. Don't wear a hoodie, but rather a zip-up sweatshirt or shirt.

Beat the Wind with Leather

It might be too hot to wear leather during the summer, but it's perfect for fall. Leather motorcycle jackets or chaps can protect you from the wind and keep you more comfortable while riding. They usually also have removable liners.

You can wear riding boots with synthetic liners and wool socks. This combination will let your feet breathe in case they get warm.

Finally, it's a good idea to wear a pair of synthetic glove liners underneath your leather biker gloves and pack fingerless leather gloves in a storage compartment. You'll be able to switch in the afternoon when you get too warm.

Switch to a Half- or Full-Visor Helmet

Cold air can be harsh on your eyes, so switch to a Department of Transportation-approved helmet.

Bring Your Rain Gear

A raw, chilling rain can cause hypothermia quickly, especially if you're not wearing the best riding attire. Always pack your rain gear, just in case.

Watch for Riding Hazards

Fallen leaves can be very slippery and cause accidents, and many deer are more active during autumn – especially during dawn and dusk. Keep your eyes out for any riding hazard so you have time to react.

Welcome to the Blue Knights International Safety Page. I am Robert (Bud) Overby, your International Safety Officer, and International Safety Committee Chairman. Your International Safety Committee is currently made up eleven appointed Conference Safety Officers and a Chairman. You can find a link to the Safety Committee list by looking under Members / Committees / Safety Committee. Contact information for each Committee Member if available on that page. We have put together this Safety Page to provide you with current Safety Related Links, a Basic Group Riders Handbook, and Entertaining and Informative Articles on Safety and State of the Art Safety Gear. Our Mission is to provide a Safer and more Enjoyable ride for everyone, while reducing risk of individual Accidents and Injuries.

It's not much different that we've done our entire Careers; Look out for each other and do whatever we can to ensure we each make it home safe. We can accomplish this by understanding how to Ride Better as a Group. We'll start by giving you some tools that are Time Tested and have been proven to work. We hope you find them as useful as we have.

Basic Group Riding Handbook

Your International Safety Committee has put together a Basic Group Riding Handbook as a guideline for Group Riding. This Handbook uses nationally recognized and practiced group riding techniques. Becoming familiar with these techniques will allow you to ride with confidence with just about ANY Organized Motorcycle Riding Group. I would ask that each of you please download this Handbook. I promise you that the time you put into reviewing it and practicing these skills while group riding will make your group rides much more enjoyable and safer for you, and everyone involved.

Pre-Ride Safety Meetings and Group Communications

Get into the habit of ALWAYS having a Pre-Ride Safety Meeting. Make this mandatory before every ride, regardless of group size. This briefing should include a Equipment Safety Check, an Oral Breakdown of the ride, and the use of Safety Officers or Road Captains spaced Front (Lead), Middle, and Rear (Sweep) if numbers permit. Make sure all riders understand their part of the ride, Group Hand Signals, and what to do in the event of an Emergency, or Group Separation. Whenever possible have your Safety Officers, and Road Captains equipped with some form of Communications when possible.

Keep your head on Swivel

Pay attention out there and ensure you have an escape route planned at all times. Utilize basic distances when riding as a group.

Don't Drink and Drive

The International Safety Committee would like to remind all our members if you are drinking - don't drive and survive the middle ages.
